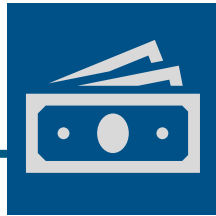

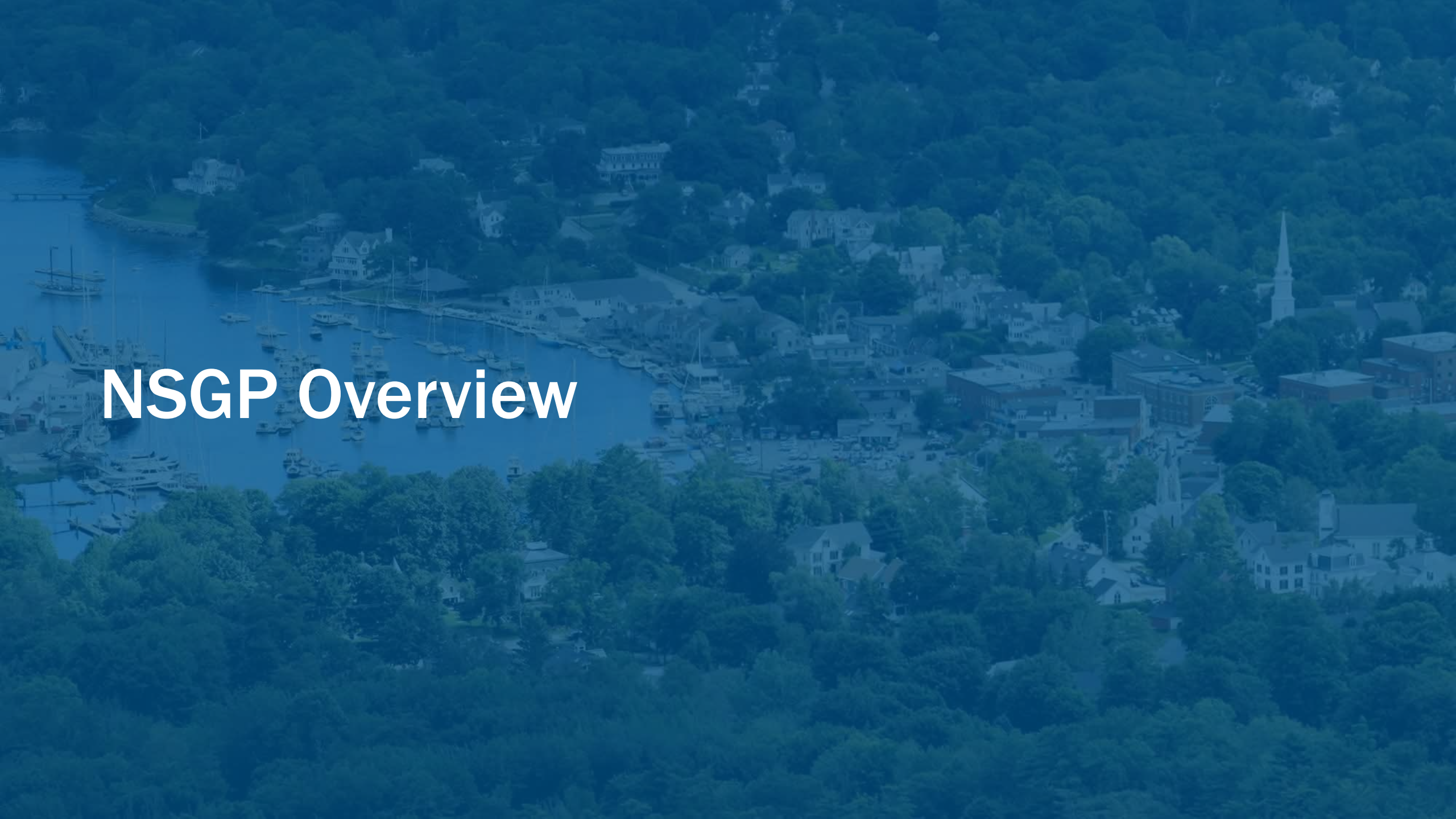

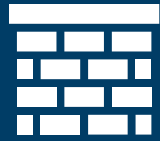


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NSGP Overview

NSGP Overview: Purpose



The NSGP focuses on enhancing the ability of nonprofit organizations to prevent and protect against terrorist attacks



This program is part of a comprehensive set of measures to help strengthen the nation's communities against potential terrorist attacks



NSGP funds are focused on security-related activities and projects that will prevent or protect against potential terrorist attacks



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NSGP Overview: Framework

How is the NSGP Structured?

- The NSGP is a **competitive** grant program intended to provide federal funding for physical security enhancements and other security-related activities to nonprofit organizations that are at risk of a terrorist attack
- Supports enhancing the protection of soft facilities/crowded places from potential **terrorist** attacks

What is the Period of Performance?

- The period of performance is traditionally 36 months from FEMA to the SAA
- SAA sets the period of performance in sub-recipient agreement (SAA to nonprofit organization), so it may be less than 36 months for nonprofits



NSGP Overview: Funding Streams

NSGP-Urban Area (NSGP-UA)

- Organizations must be physically located **inside** of a high-risk urban area as designated through the Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI)
- The list of UAs is updated annually and will be announced through the NSGP and HSGP NOFOs.

Location-Based Application

NSGP-State (NSGP-S)

- Organizations must be physically located **outside** of a high-risk urban area as designated through the Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI)

Important reminders about location

Apply for the funding stream based on where the specific building is physically located.

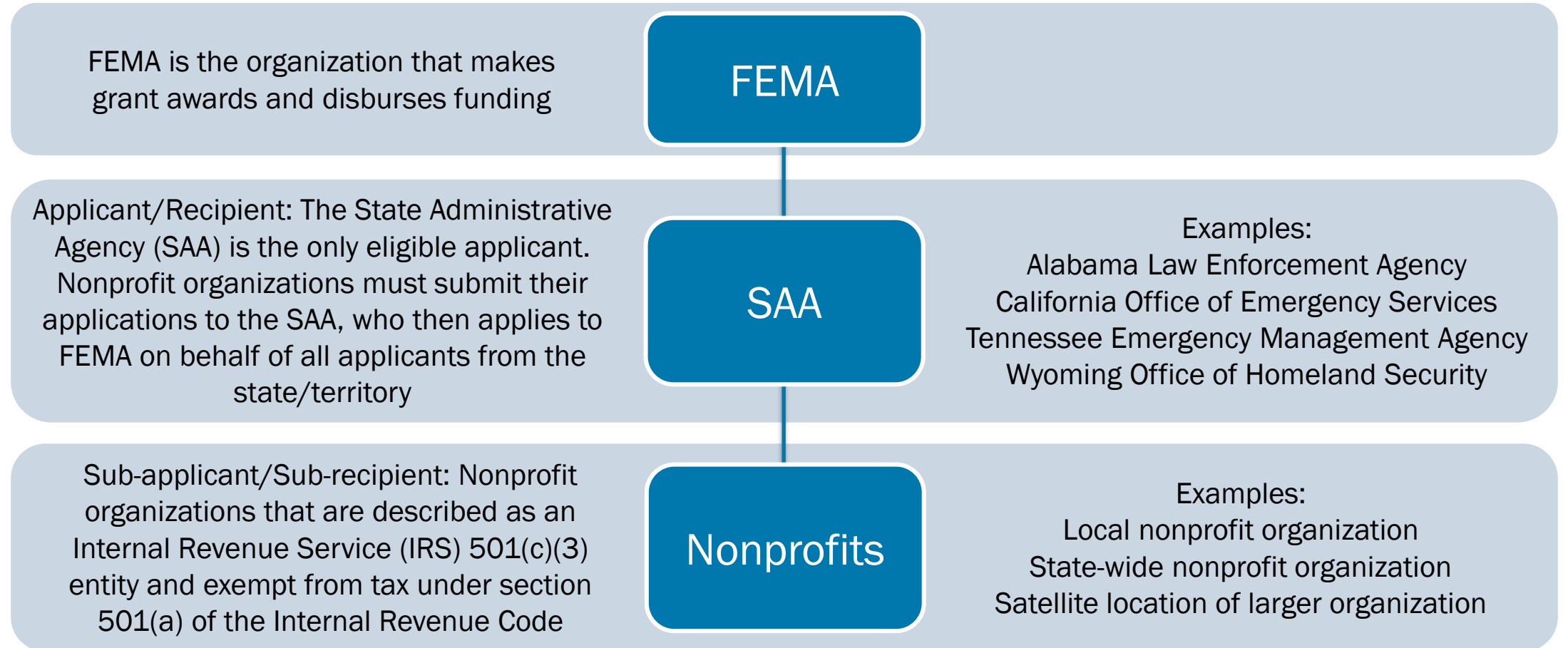
The building in the application must be occupied and fully operational at the time of application.

Please contact your SAA with questions about the funding stream your organization should apply under as the boundaries of designated UAs are NOT necessarily the same as local city and/or MSA limits.

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NSGP Overview: Eligibility



What type of entities/organizations are eligible to apply under NSGP?

*Eligible organizations are registered 501(c)(3) nonprofits or otherwise are organizations as described under 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and tax-exempt under section 501(a) of the IRC. The list below is not exhaustive and only provides examples of potential eligible organizations, all of which **must** be nonprofits.*

Educational facilities

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NSGP Overview: Eligibility



What type of entities/organizations are not eligible to apply under NSGP?



Utility Companies



Organizations active in politics/lobbying



For-profit hospitals



For-profit colleges/universities



Volunteer fire departments



Governmental entities



For-profit venues, stadiums, amusement parks, clubs, etc.



For-profit transportation entities



Municipal/public schools
(elementary, middle, or high schools)



Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions Clubs, etc.



Homeowner associations, labor unions, etc.



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NSGP Overview: Allowable Project/Activities Examples

- Contract security guards/personnel
- Planning (safety/security/evacuation)
- Training (active assailant/first aid/awareness)
- Cybersecurity/technology (supports infrastructure protection projects)
- Security cameras/CCTV
- Fences/bollards/barriers
- Security enhanced doors/windows/locks
- Warning and notification systems
- Access control systems/alarms
- Exercises (active shooter/assailant /bomb threat)
- Grant management and administration (M&A) (up to 5% of grant award)
- Security screening equipment
- Blast proof/resistant windows/doors
- Security monitoring services (POP)



NSGP Overview: Unallowable Project/Activities Examples

- Organizational operating costs
- Direct hiring of public safety personnel
- General-use expenditures
- Duplicative grant funded projects/activates
- Development of risk or vulnerability assessments
- License Plate Reader (LPR) systems
- Facial recognition software
- Knox Boxes
- Fire suppression/sprinkler systems/extinguishers
- Guns/weapons or weapons training
- Landscaping /grounds maintenance
- Studies or technology development/prototyping
- Proof-of-concept or test-bed initiatives
- Sexual Predator Screening Database
- Organizational salaries
- Debris removal
- Air purification systems/HVAC
- Self defense training/tasers/pepper spray



FY 2022 NSGP Recap

FY 2022 Funding Changes

How much funding was made available through the NSGP in FY22?

Under the FY22 NSGP, Congress appropriated **\$250 million** across the two funding streams for nonprofits, including 5% of award amounts for SAA Management & Administration (M&A).

NSGP-Urban Area (NSGP-UA)

Funded nonprofit organizations physically located within one of the 36 FY 2022 Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI)-designated urban areas



- **\$125 million** for NSGP-UA, an increase of \$35M from FY 2021
 - **\$6.25 million** designated for SAA M&A
- **\$150,000 per site**, for up to three sites, for a maximum of \$450,000 per sub-applicant

NSGP-State (NSGP-S)

Funded nonprofit organizations physically located outside a of the 36 FY 2022 Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI)-designated urban areas



- **\$125 million** for NSGP-S, an increase of \$35M from FY 2021
 - **\$6.25 million** designated for SAA M&A
- **\$150,000 per site**, for up to three sites, for a maximum of \$450,000 per sub-applicant

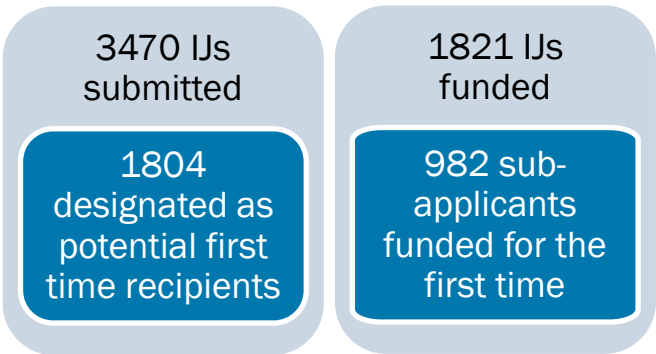
FY 2022 Scoring Changes

What changes were made to federally-applied bonus points for FY22?

In the FY22 NSGP Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO), bonus points for first-time recipients were increased from 5 points to 15 points. Bonus points for organizations located in vulnerable areas were awarded based on vulnerability as determined by the Center for Disease Control’s Social Vulnerability Index (SVI).

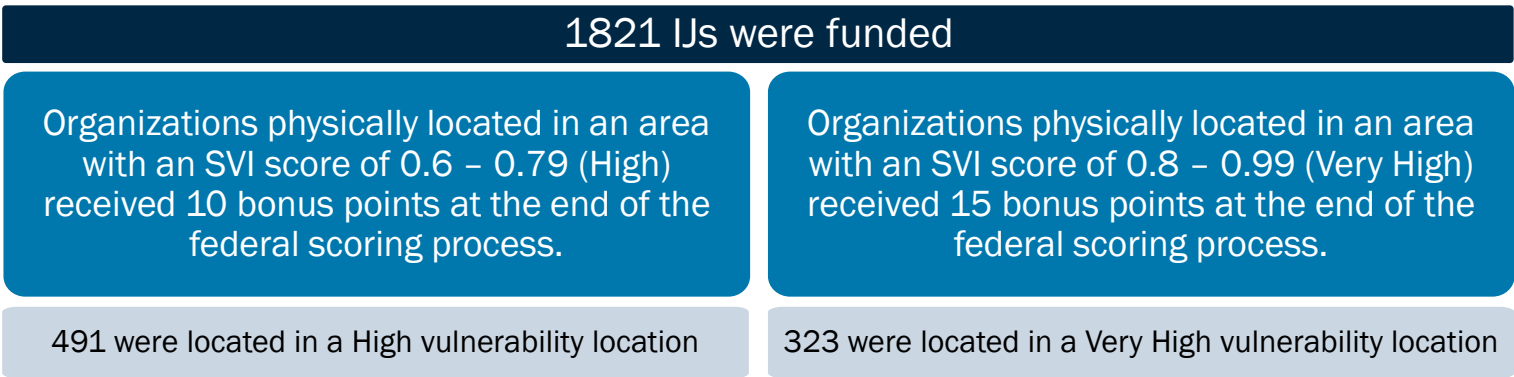
First Time Recipients

Applicants who have not previously been awarded federal NSGP funding received 15 bonus points at the end of the federal scoring process.



SVI Scores

The SVI scale managed by the CDC is a numerical value between 0 and 1 that reflects community resilience based on census response data. NSGP uses this publicly-available data to determine which applicants are in the most vulnerable locations.

FY 2022 Application Key Takeaways

1

Duplicative applications: If you hire a grant writer, review their work. Limit copy and pasting between IJs if applying for multiple locations.

2

Administratively incomplete/insufficient: The FEMA-provided IJ must be submitted. Any incomplete packages will not be reviewed by FEMA.

3

Unallowable/out of scope expenditures: Ensure that all requested expenditures align with the program rules and objectives.

4

Organizations applying on behalf of ineligible entities: Nonprofits may not act as a pass through for a government or for-profit entity.

5

Valid UEI number: For FY23 applications, valid UEIs MUST be included on submitted IJs or the IJ will be eliminated.

6

Threats/Risks/Vulnerability: Nonprofits must tie the threats and risks to existing physical vulnerabilities. All must tie to terrorism.

7

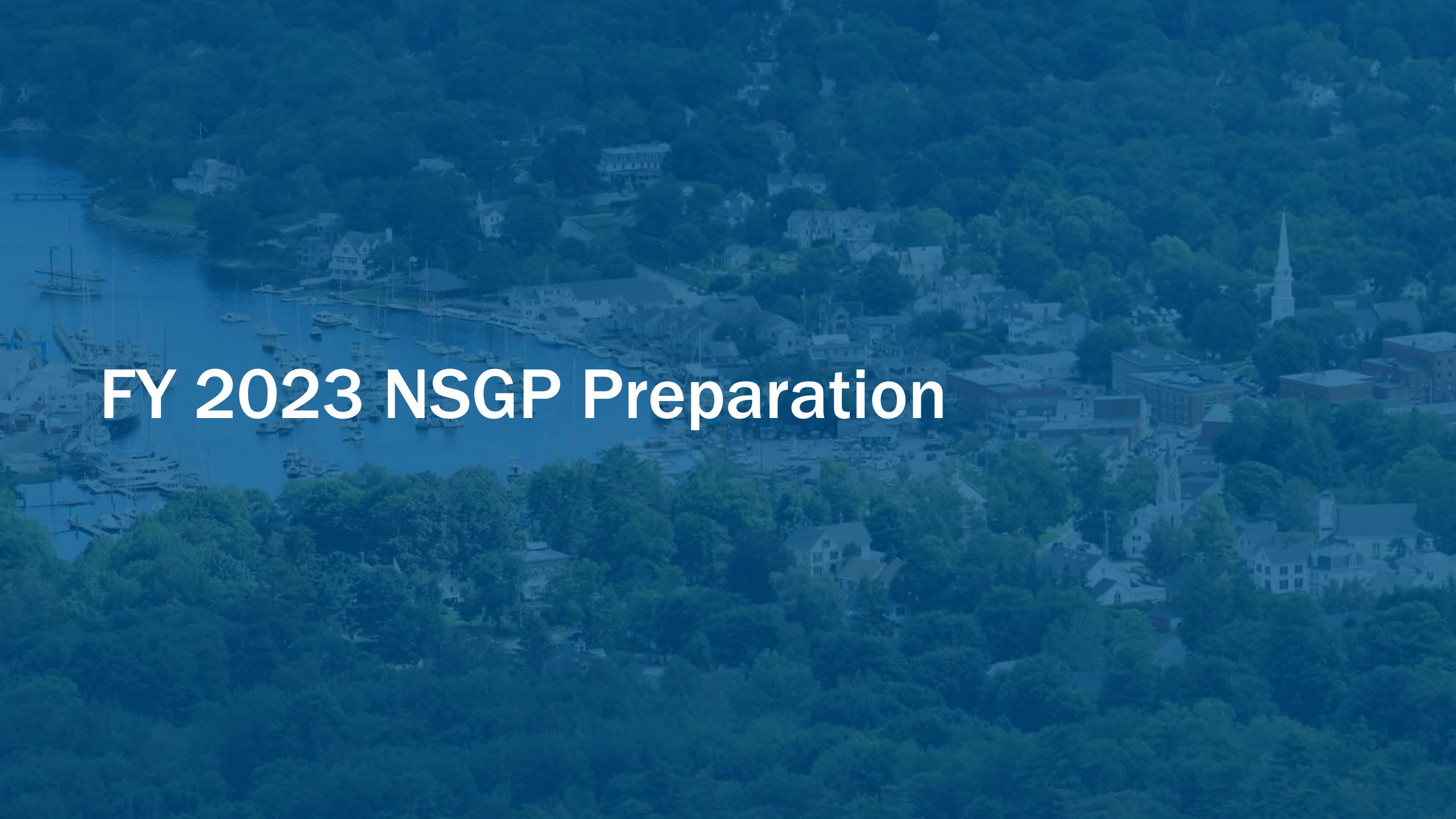
Direct hiring of law enforcement/public safety officials:
Contract security CANNOT be sole sourced.

8

Misaligned or unrealistic narratives, timelines, projects/activities: The IJ content and award goals should be logical, reasonable, and feasible.



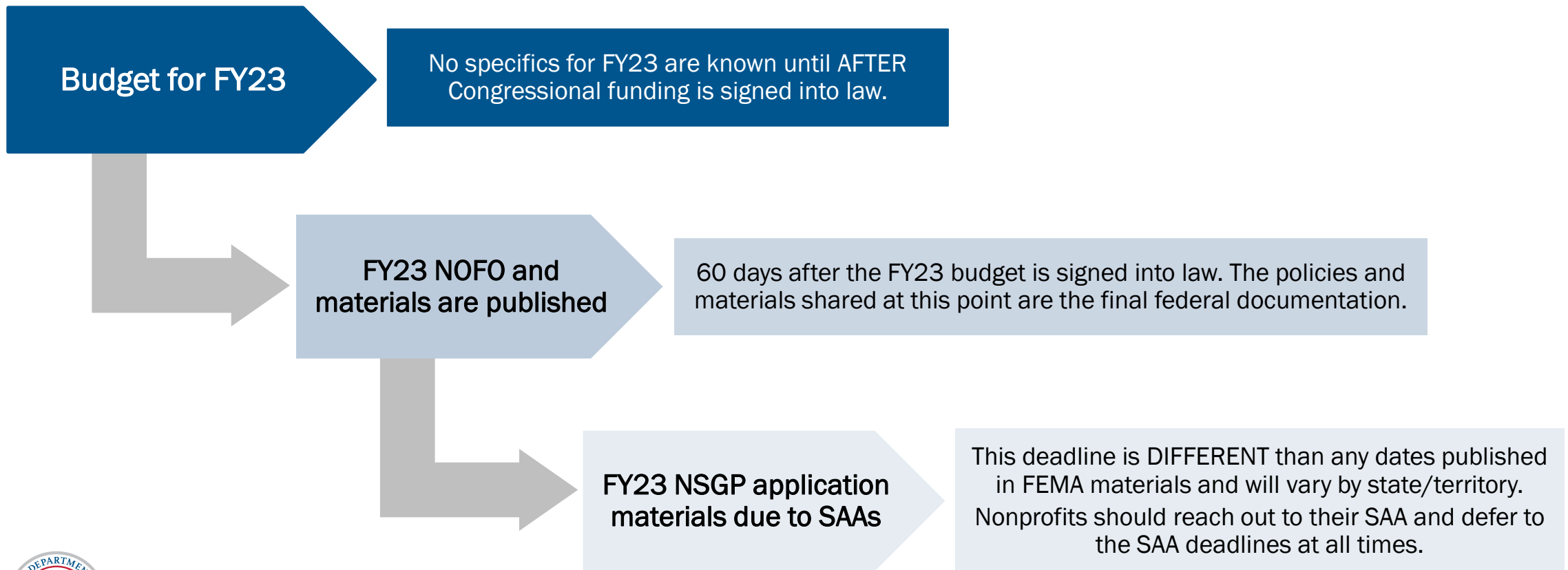
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FY 2023 NSGP Preparation

FY 2023 NSGP Timeline

NSGP has not yet been federally funded for FY23.



Application Elements

Reviewed by SAA ONLY

Materials required and/or requested by the SAA to validate the information in the IJ. The materials are not provided to FEMA reviewers and are not part of the federal scoring process.



Mission Statement: Used to validate information in the IJ and to categorize the facility (ideology-based, education, medical, and other)



Completed Vulnerability Assessment: Foundation of the IJ content. Addresses vulnerabilities in context of the threats and consequences of potential events at a facility/site. Proposed equipment, projects, and activities should directly link to mitigating specific vulnerabilities.



Supporting Documentation, if applicable: Materials to help validate/support content of vulnerability assessment and investment justification, such as police or insurance reports. *Reach out to your SAA to better understand any state level requirements, processes, templates, timelines, etc.*

Reviewed by SAA and FEMA

The IJ is the only document reviewed and scored by FEMA.



Completed Investment Justification (IJ): Outlines the investment and relevant projects. Includes summaries of information provided in mission statements, VAs, etc. Requires a budget narrative and breakdown, timeline, and project plan. Is the only document reviewed by FEMA (no attachments or supplements will be reviewed).

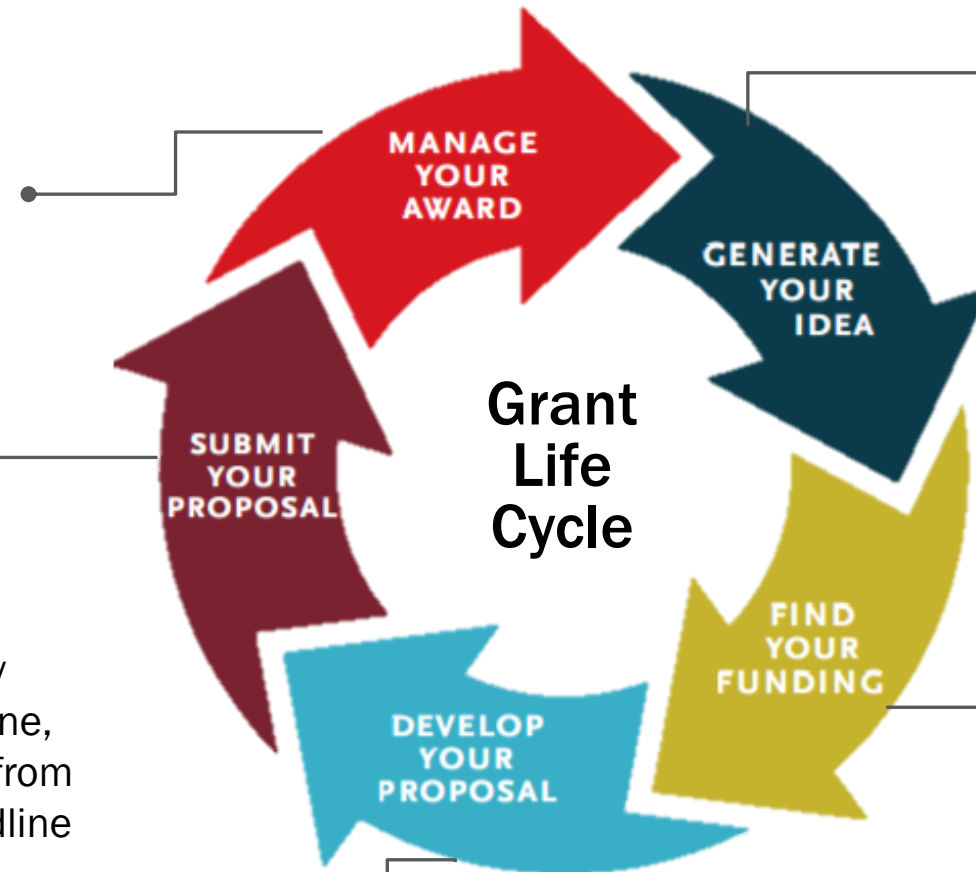


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Preparatory Cycle Considerations

- **Post Award** - Manage award/projects based on approved projects and activities to completion based on milestones provided

- **Know your SAA POC**
 - Each SAA is unique
 - Early preparation is key
 - Submit by SAA's deadline, which will be different from FEMA's published deadline



- **Research** – Threats/risks
- **Complete** - Vulnerability Assessment
- **Identify** – material/physical weaknesses
- **Generate** – priority list of possible activities/projects
- **Estimate** – costs and timelines
- **FY 2023 NSGP NOFO** – Release TBD, based on annual Appropriations (+60 days)
- **Application timeline** for FY 2023 application deadline TBD (recipient vs. subrecipient)

- **Use FY 2022 NSGP materials** as guides in development
